





MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR VILLAGE PROPERTY TAX RATE LOWEST AMONG AREA COMMUNITIES

If you're feeling a little grumpy right now, you're not alone. According to the latest census, almost all of us in Sherman are homeowners. That means we all just paid our last

installment of property taxes for the year.

Full breakdowns of the tax bills for residents in the two primary townships that cover Sherman are on page two. A reminder that all of those categories represent services that contribute to the standard of living that makes Sherman the great community it is, and keep our home values high.


That includes the small portion that comes back to the Village of Sherman for operations – less than 2% of the total tax bill, or about \$127 a year for a home valued at \$200,000.

We work hard to keep that rate as low as possible and are proud of how we stack up against the other comparable communities in Sangamon County. Not only is our Village tax levy the lowest, but when you compare all taxing bodies together, Sherman is STILL the lowest.

Break it down and you are paying between \$10 - \$25 per month for Village services for homes valued at \$150,000 - \$400,000. That's about 33 - 84-cents per day, less than the price of a cup of coffee. So, what does that fund?

- Highly Trained and Equipped Police Protection
- State of the Art Emergency Management Center with highly trained Director
- Public Works department to manage the day to day maintenance and repair of roads, drainage, sewer, sidewalks, mowing, limb pick up and much more
- Professional Administrative Staff to oversee all Village Business, including Budget, HR, and Community Event Planning
- Professional Economic Development Team to implement planning and development which has produced a major grocery store, Walgreens and much much more



- Professionally Trained Staff to implement comprehensive planning and development of Parks and Recreation
- Special Services Semi Annual Village Wide Garage Sales, Annual Clean Up Day, Branch Pickup Program and more
- Recreational activities and events such as car shows, concerts, movie nights, festive light pole banners, July 4th fireworks, holiday tree decorating and children's Christmas party



NASHVILLE STAR RETURNS FOR SEPTEMBER 29 CONCERT AT VILLAGE PARK

These days, she performs at the iconic Nashville honky-tonk, Tootsie's Orchid Lounge, but locals remember a talented, fresh-faced 16 year-old who launched her career fronting the country cover band Still Kickin'.

That was a decade ago. The 2010 WHS graduate and Sherman native has been in Nashville for five years now, writing music and performing at the historical landmark venue on the same stage that has showcased Charlie Pride, Garth Brooks, Luke Bryan, and others.

She returns home with her band on September 29 to perform at the Amphitheater. While mom (and manager) Lori lives nearby in Tennessee, Kelsey said she is eager to be home and see dad Ron Hickman, and to make a quick visit to a favorite pizza place that used to employ her.

"I am really looking forward to that food at Sam's Too!" said Kelsey, with a laugh. "I want a pan of that rigatoni."

While most people who follow Kelsey's career know about her hit single "Gone" two years ago, many don't realize the years of hard work and luck it took to get there.

"When I moved to Nashville, I just started going to honkytonks all over town to ask for shifts," said Kelsey. "I went into Tootsie's and they said 'Yeah, here are some shifts', and that's really how it started."

The shifts were 10 a.m. -2 p.m., then she said she would go home and sleep, and return to sing 10 p.m. -2 a.m. five days a week. It was grueling, but she kept writing music and dreaming of an album.

Then, one day she sent an email to Kurt Wells, the producer and guitar player for Dolly Parton. He emailed her back.

"I was, like 'Whaaat?' said Kelsey. "He agreed to help and I can't believe how fortunate I was. With their vision and experience, my single was released and they also helped me promote it."

"Gone" landed on the Music Row Top 100. The success changed things, moving Kelsey off the split shifts at Tootsie's and into the prime Friday-Saturday-Sunday 6 – 10 p.m. slots. In addition, mom Lori works to book tours and as many events as she can,



as Kelsey and her bandmates like to perform on the road.

"Venues are hard to crack, but I was raised to keep going," said Kelsey. "I'm going to keep writing music for an album I hope to release next spring. This is not done yet."

That positive spirit will be on full display September 29 as Sherman opens its arms for a favorite daughter.

"I love it!" said Kelsey. "Being young in that town was so much fun."

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
