SHERMAN RESIDENTS BENEFIT FROM VILLAGE OUTREACH BEHIND THE SCENES

INCREASED INTERNET SPEED FOR CASS COMM CUSTOMERS

This is a biggie. I know, because we have been fielding resident concerns about internet speed and viewing quality for a long time and have had multiple meetings with representatives of Cass Comm to express those concerns.

Well, get ready for major improvement. Cass Comm is installing fiber optic technology that will provide higher band width for internet and higher quality viewing capabilities.

The installation project is **expected to be completed** in Fall 2019. More details on this change will be coming directly from Cass Comm to its customers.

AT&T CELL PHONE CUSTOMERS TO GET FASTER SPEED, INCREASED COVERAGE

This came out of numerous complaints from residents that were cell customers of AT&T, infuriated that they faced slow speeds and dropped calls in this area.

We reached out to representatives of AT&T Wireless over the years and in recent months and the company, to its credit, was more than open to working with the Village to fix the problem.

As a result, the Village has approved AT&T installing the first of several small cells to boost coverage atop some of our light poles.

The photo shows what it may look like. What it represents is a good faith effort to negotiate a solution that benefits AT&T customers in Sherman. Watch for project completion by late summer or early fall 2019. Thanks to all involved!

TWO HIGHLY ANTICIPATED TRAILS PROJECTS GAINING MOMENTUM


The Village of Sherman and the town of Williamsville are working closely with IDOT as the state agency prepares to go to bid on the highly anticipated Bike Trail project no later than this fall!


That is a significant milestone for the joint project and one step closer to realizing the dream of opening the trail to bikers, runners, and walkers.

"The Village Engineer and administrative staff have been directed to work diligently with IDOT in getting this project to bid and construction as soon as possible," said Mayor Trevor Clatfelter. "If everything goes as planned, that means bid-letting this summer or fall, construction beginning in early 2020, and open to the public by the end of 2020."

IDOT representatives are finishing the final land acquisitions required to construct the bike trail as well as the necessary lease agreements for land use, construction and maintenance of the new trail.

Sherman and Williamsville co-sponsored a grant application several years ago to secure funding for the development of a bike trail between the two communities. The location of the trail makes use of the utility right-of-way that runs between Sherman and Williamsville along the east side of Interstate 55.





The approximately 5-mile path will be an asphalt-paved two-lane path that begins in Sherman at a future trailhead to be located near Bahr Road off Andrew Road and will have rest stops along the way.

"This is so long-awaited and desired by residents in both communities who deserve another great recreation avenue," said Clatfelter. "The construction of this trail will open Sherman up to favorable funding of other trail development projects around the Village."

VILLAGE MOVES FORWARD WITH TRAIL PLANS ALONG OLD TIPTON SCHOOL ROAD

It's a summer 2019 start date for the first phase of a project that will provide safe passage to Village Park for neighborhood families.

Phase I will include an 8-ft. hard surface multi-use, non-motorized trail from Redbud Run to Village Park along the west corridor of Old Tipton School Road.

Phase II (tentatively 2020) will extend the trail from Redbud Run to St. John's Drive, including a safety route across Old Tipton School Road. Village staff are preparing for upcoming grant opportunities with IDNR and IDOT to assist in the funding of this project.

SHERMAN WORKING OVERTIME TO SECURE GRANT FUNDING

FINANCIAL HEALTH MAKES VILLAGE ATTRACTIVE APPLICANT

Success breeds success. With the construction of the new Village Park, the beautification of Sherman Blvd., the increase in residential population, and the increase in economic development, Sherman has become a strong competitor for quality of life grant awards.

"We are now on a path of securing grant funding for projects where we were unsuccessful before," said Mayor Trevor Clatfelter. "Because of our financial health and stability, we have the means to match funds and complete projects. And thanks to building Village Park, we are a strong contender to get part of the State's annual \$30 million fund for outdoor recreation and related grants."



This early rendering is similar to what the Village envisions for Village Park – a total of four stations with varied equipment along the bike/walking path – and is pursuing funding options.

Clatfelter said there are two important factors that funding agencies look for when considering applications. First is commitment.

"Funding agencies that are distributing money for certain projects want to know that you have a strong commitment to the same

priorities," said Clatfelter. "In our case, when we apply for grants for recreation projects, for example, we can show that we have consistently pursued and won grant funding for open parks, bike trails, playground equipment, safe access projects, and more. In their view, that is a strong indicator that we will spend the new funds wisely."

Secondly, and equally important, is having a strong financial position in general.

"Most grants require a financial match. The ability to maintain the grant-awarded projects for a minimum of 20 years or, in some cases, perpetuity, is critical to a successful application," said Clatfelter. "Thanks to sound financial management and planning, Sherman is in a very strong position to secure the award. We intend to maintain that position, and continue our momentum and our record of application success."

Planned Grant Applications to Benefit Residents of Sherman:

Multi-Use Pedestrian Walkways/Bike Path Grants (IDNR and IDOT).

- A path from Andrew Road to Red Bud Run with safe access routes across Old Tipton School Road.
- A path from Andrew Road at Zimmerman Drive south to Meredith Drive, along First street to Business 55/Sherman Blvd into Village Park
- A path from the "Trail Head" of the future Sherman/ Williamsville Bike Trail on Andrew Road across Interstate 55.

Route 66 Wayside Park (IDNR OSLAD grant)

- Redevelopment of Route 66/Veterans Memorial Park to include walking bridge
- Reclamation of the original Route 66 Road that remains
- A new Shelter and Veterans Memorial
- A themed entry sign
- Park landscaping and a new parking area for visitors

Village Park Components (IDNR OSLAD/LWFA grant)

- New components to include items such as exercise stations
- Park signage and landscaping
- Flag memorial area
- Water feature
- Additional hard-paved parking with decorative lighting and landscaped islands


